



Welcome to the newly elected OFF Committee for 2022. President, Kim Wagstaff, was re-elected as were Adrian Polhill and Graham Lalchere as Vice-Presidents. We welcome to the committee Sue de Beuzeville and Sue Howard who will jointly take over the Membership Officer role from Robin Dickson, who is retiring after 13 years in the position and 28 years on committee. Thank you Robin. Vicki Bolling will become Minute Secretary following Liz Cameron's retirement from the Secretary's position. Thank you Liz as well. However, we still require a member(s) to undertake the remaining duties of the Secretary's role. Please consider.

SECRETARY'S REPORT, SUMMARY: Liz Cameron

Highlights:

- Revegetation of parks & reserves - 950 native plants, over 140 hours of labour; collaboration with GSLN's Creating Canopies program & GRC.
- Signage installed on Headland Track in Oatley Park and linked to OFF website, interpretive brochures printed.
- Council adopted two place names OFF proposed – Boorea for Oatley reserve that OFF has revegetated, and Myles Dunphy Creek.
- Membership grew to 312.
- \$6,000 in research grants disbursed to three postgraduate students.
- Objections lodged to DAs for properties in Foreshore Scenic Protection Area – including 'Glenlee', Lugarno.
- Submissions on GRC Management Plans for Oatley Bowling Club site and Oatley Flying-fox Camp.
- Submissions on Draft PoM for Royal NP, Kosciuszko NP Wild Horse Heritage, Warragamba Dam Raising Project.
- Successful bid to hold nature photography exhibition in Hurstville Museum and Gallery next June.
- Propagated casuarinas, shrubs and trees to revegetate rural properties; planted eucalypts at Kurnell Desalination Plant.

Campaigns:

- Repair damage to Oatley Park and other bushland from unauthorised bike tracks, unregulated parking in OP; requests to Council to rectify damage, suggestions for mitigation. Supported dedicated bike facility.
- OP Plan of Mgt & Master Plan – Council invited OFF's feedback.
- Loss of trees in LGA – lobbied for creation of Significant Tree Register and for all tree removal applications to be posted on GRC website.
- Mine threats to water resources - opposed Wongawilli Colliery - Modification 2 Proposal - under Sydney Water Catchment.
- Koalas – supported funding for "Koala Corridor" documentary; attended Koala Day of Action; petitioned Minister for Environment to save Menangle Creek Koala Corridor from development.
- Promoted Save Glenlee (Lugarno) campaign
- Health hazards of wood heaters – lobbied local and state governments.

Maintenance and Monitoring

- Bushcare at four sites (140 hours); Streamwatch and rubbish audits in Dairy and Myles Dunphy Creeks (60 hours). Clean Up Australia Day with Oatley Lions in Poulton Park (27 registered). Georges River Paddle Against Plastic, Graffiti Removal Day
- New focus on pollution by microplastics from synthetic turf playing fields

Membership and Activities

- Eleven issues of OFF News published, Facebook page continues to promote activities
- Ten meetings held, four in person with simultaneous broadcast via Zoom; six on Zoom only. Average audience 35; 56 for Richard Kingsford's presentation on Sturt NP. Four recipients of OFF research grants gave talks. Up to 14 visitors logged into individual Zoom broadcasts. Most presentations uploaded to OFF's YouTube channel.
- Only three field activities, average of 11 participants; 18 joined Sharyn Cullis's trip to SW Sydney where a Koala population is threatened.
- Three pre-Christmas street stalls with OHHS and Oatley Lions in Oatley and Mortdale. Annual Dinner cancelled but 31 attended Annual Picnic in Oatley Park Castle in December.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS, SUMMARY: Kim Wagstaff

As we can see from Liz's report, OFF covered a lot of territory not only in terms of issues but also ranging from local to state and national. We have put in a huge effort towards delivering our mission. Recent successes include:

Tree/shrub planting: In 2017, OFF members committed to various 're-greening' events and on-going maintenance in an effort to reverse the impacts of development on local habitat. Over 5 years in excess of 8450 plants were planted and maintained at 6 sites: Boorea and Moore Reserves, Gannon's Park, parts of Hurstville Golf Course and 2 sites in Peakhurst. More than 1290 volunteer hours were contributed. These re-greening events represent wins for the community, wildlife and the environment.

Research Grants OFF Research Grants have proved to be very successful. Many of the winning recipients from previous years have given presentations at OFF meetings. Those of you who have seen them I'm sure would be very satisfied that our consolidated, donated funds are going towards significant research projects enhancing our knowledge of Australia's flora and fauna. In 2021, from 11 applications, 3 were chosen to receive \$2000 each. We look forward to hearing about their research in the coming year.

Membership numbers - have been maintained if not increased slightly and we are forging and leveraging connections and partnerships with other local organisations and umbrella environmental groups. Working together certainly energises us all and increases our influence and the likelihood of positive outcomes from our combined effort. OFF continues this successful strategy.

The year ahead –

Nature photographic exhibition – This initiative pursues OFF's core business of raising awareness of our native flora and fauna. To be held in May/June at Hurstville Museum and Gallery, using exhibits of local photographers, OFF seeks to highlight the biodiversity that makes our bushland rich and special – the beautiful, unusual and overlooked plants and animals that live around us. I encourage all members to spread the word.

Oatley Park Plan of Management and Masterplan - OFF was started by local residents defending the local bushland from pillaging and has defended the integrity of the iconic Oatley Park ever since. Council is seeking local users' views for new plans. We must contribute strongly and comprehensively to this process to ensure the high value of the Park's flora and fauna is acknowledged with the top priority for management actions.

Georges River Council relations - I believe we can look forward to much better communication with GRC and greater acceptance of our objectives for the local environment, with the recent election of 7 new councillors, in particular those from Georges River Residents and Ratepayers including Oatley resident and OFF member Peter Mahoney. The group's statement of environmental initiatives aligns well with OFF's aims in its activities.

Vote of Thanks I'd like to thank all the OFF committee members for their support, contributions and hard work in keeping OFF running effectively and efficiently, in particular two members who are retiring from their current roles. Special thanks to **Liz Cameron** for her huge effort in the role of Secretary for 13 years. You have heard, in Liz's report, all the activities that we have undertaken in the year. This level of activity has been increasing in the last decade of OFF's existence which would not have been possible without Liz's tireless contribution to OFF's work. Supporting and keeping track of the range of projects has really kept OFF up to date with current issues and has underpinned the achievements of the whole Society. Thank you so much Liz! **Robin Dickson** is retiring from the committee after 28 years, filling the role of Secretary for 11 years and that of Membership and Welfare officer for 17 years. Robin's good-natured dedication to the role of chasing up and recording memberships as well as following up member welfare issues has really contributed to the high and increasing membership numbers by filling that vital role of two way communication, keeping members in touch with OFF and OFF in touch with members. Thank you very much Robin.

Finally, **thank you all OFF members** for your support and participation. Please continue providing feedback on our activities, events and campaigns – improvements and suggested new ones. Together we can work to protect, conserve and enhance the natural environment – locally and globally.

28 February 2022 — Effects of reintroduction of Western Quoll on prey species, and Refuges for Crest-tailed Mulgara after drought.

These topics will be presented by UNSW postgraduates who were OFF 2021 grant recipients.

Ben Stepkovitch will present his findings from investigating both positive and negative effects on the ecosystem of reintroducing a native predator, the western quoll (*Dasyurus geoffroii*), inside the Arid Recovery fenced reserve, South Australia. Ben is a Research grant recipient studying for his PhD at the UNSW Centre for Ecosystem Science, School of Biological, Earth and Environmental Sciences. He also studied urban red foxes in Sydney for his Master of Research.

Dympna Cullen will tell us about her research to determine the attributes and connectivity of ecological refuges for the crest-tailed mulgara following a prolonged period of drought. Dympna is a PhD candidate at UNSW and works as a Casual Senior Field Ecologist for the Australian Wildlife Conservancy (AWC) on various translocations and surveys, and as an independent Wildlife Biologist on various projects. Prior to commencing her PhD, Dympna worked and did research at Scotia Sanctuary and researched Koalas on Kangaroo Island.

19 March (Saturday) – Shorebirds of Boat Harbour walk, Kamay-Botany Bay NP and Boat Harbour

Walk approx 2.5 km each way from Voodoo Point carpark; fairly flat terrain along beaches, sand dunes and intertidal rock platforms, some scrubbing and short bush bashing through low shrubbery to sandy track, down rough rock steps to Boat Harbour beach and intertidal rock platform. View migratory and resident shorebirds, perhaps Red-necked Stint, Ruddy Turnstone and Pacific Golden Plover coming into breeding plumage before they head off on migration to Arctic breeding grounds- Also resident Sooty Oystercatchers, terns and cormorants. Possible picnic lunch in Kamay-Botany Bay NP on the hill above Captain Cook obelisk and later optional swim at Silver Beach. Meet 8:30 am, Sir Joseph Banks Dr, Kurnell, opp entrance to the Desal Plant where we can rationalise cars as restricted parking at Voodoo Point carpark in Kamay-Botany Bay NP where walk starts. Medium difficulty, slippery rock platform, danger of snakes, exposure. Wear sturdy bushwalking sandals, sneakers or bushwalking shoes you don't mind getting wet. Hats, sunscreen, general sun protection.
