CONSERVATION OF KELP FORESTS

One of the OFF Research Grant recipients, Aaron Eger gave a very interesting presentation at our August meeting. Aaron's presentation focused on the need to protect our kelp forests which not unlike land forests are rapidly disappearing. Kelp forests exist in cooler waters and not surprisingly water temperature is a factor in kelp forests' decline. Human activities including cutting kelp is also impacting these forests. Kelp forests are particularly important for many species of marine life and for some species critical for their survival. Worldwide, there has been a huge reduction in forests and for example, the Tasmania kelp forests have declined by 80%. Fortunately, there is a worldwide group that is actively regenerating kelp forests and helping educate the population of the benefit of having healthy kelp forests in our oceans.

PROTECTING GLENLEE

Friends of Glenlee's Linda Simon has advised that "A meeting was recently convened by the State Minister for the Environment with representatives of Georges River Council (staff and councillors) to which FoG President, Brian Ralston, was invited to participate. No resolution of the issue regarding the public acquisition of Glenlee was reached. However, the Minister and Council have agreed to undertake

further investigations, following which a further meeting will be held."

At the Council meeting of 28/8/23 via a motion put forward by Councillor Mahoney it was unanimously resolved:

(a) That Council supports the preparation of a business case which details options for possible future uses for Glenlee,

(b) That the General Manager approaches the Hon. Penny Sharpe, to seek full funding for the preparation of the business case.

This is another positive step towards building the case for ultimately bringing Glenlee into the public domain.

RE-GREENING

Another 600 plants were planted on the weekend of August 26 & 27 at Vince Heffernans 'Moorlands' property. 14 volunteers contributed to the productive environmental transformation commenced 25 years ago. Volunteers came from Ulladulla, Goulburn, Sydney, Culburra and Canberra to add to the 1300 native trees and shrubs planted 2 weeks earlier, augmenting the grassy woodland habitat of the Superb Parrot and many other species of native animals and birds. Over the next two months another 3500-4000 trees and shrubs will be planted on various dates listed via this link.

.SAVE SYDNEY'S KOALA PETITION.

There is a healthy, thriving koala colony in Sydney!

Sydney's koalas were driven to near extinction back in the 1930s due to the prolific demand for their pelts. But in south west Sydney the Holsworthy Military reserve gave sanctuary to a handful of survivors, that were left alone for the next 80 years, allowing the koalas time to recover. This colony is also Chlamydia free, unlike many other populations in Australia, which have often been left infertile and blind.

But now, just as this special little koala colony's numbers have grown, and they are once again venturing out into South Western Sydney around Campbelltown and Appin in search of new habitat, they face new threats. They are now being killed by cars as they try to cross the treacherous Appin and Heathcote roads. And now there is another threat to their survival.


Thirty thousand new homes and a 6 lane highway upgrade are planned as part of the Macarthur Priority Growth Area, including a housing project by Lendlease at Mt Gilead. This estate cuts through the closest point between the Georges River and the Nepean River, both vital bushland corridors for koalas and other wildlife. If this development goes ahead as planned it will destroy this vital koala corridor and habitat.

The Total Environment Centre is now running a petition to the NSW Legislative Assembly to save these Koalas. Please sign this petition which includes measures to protect these precious animals from further harm

SOLAR ENERGY IMPACT ON OUR ELECTRICITY CONSUMPTION

The media frequently are critical of our moves to reduce our carbon emissions and in particular that we should keep our coal fired power stations in service as they are essential for reliable power supply. However, what is not reported is how much power people with solar panels are providing and what a

huge impact that is having on coal fired electricity. This graph shows the power consumption in NSW over 24 hours on Tuesday 5th September. The colours in the graph are solar yellow, wind - green, hydro blue and black coal. Remarkably it shows that in the middle of the day solar is providing almost 60% of our needs with wind power providing another 12% with



coal only providing 28%! The majority of the solar power is coming from roof top installations. Of course, once the sun goes down coal is again dominant but wind and hydro are still providing 25% of the power needs. With more wind turbines and much more storage, we would be able to significantly change the power spread and eventually eliminate coal fired generation.

18 September 2023: Social Science Research into Weed Management, Sonia Graham

Associate Professor Sonia Graham, a researcher at the University of Wollongong, for 15 years has studied how and why land managers and government agencies work together to manage weeds, and examining the benefits and costs of doing so.

Successful weed management programs often focus on number of weeds removed or restoration of native vegetation. But weeding is a social activity not just ecological. Sonia will explain what social science tells us about what people think about weeds, whether they talk to others about weeds and what drives them to work together with others, and discuss the range of social benefits from people working together and why we need to think more about people when planning weed management programs
