APPLYING ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE (AI) TO CAMERA IMAGERY TO IMPROVE WILDLIFE CONSERVATION AND MANAGEMENT.

Jessica Tin-Ying Tam, an OFF research grant recipient presented a very interesting and easy to understand overview of her research into using computer vision to automatically identify species of wildlife in camera trap images. Artificial intelligence (AI) has opened many doors for the automatic analysis of large volumes of data and applications to analyse imagery data have exploded in the last decade. But these tools are emerging relatively slowly in the ecological space, especially for detecting threatened species and facilitating their conservation. Jessica explained various AI models which she trained and tested using different numbers of wildlife images. Research by Jessica and some colleagues will be useful to support the Wild Deserts project lead by Professor Richard Kingsford at UNSW.

RE-GREENING

1. Moorlands Bird Count

The second survey of birds in regenerated areas took place on 13th October. Despite cold windy weather (max. ~ 10°C), Graham Fry and Liz Cameron, with two South Australian birding friends, recorded 107 birds at 5 sites. This was fewer than the autumn count in April (246) but there were more species - 32 versus 27; recently-arrived summer migrants included Rufous Whistlers, Western Gerygones and a Shining Bronze Cuckoo. The difference may be that Oct is peak breeding season for many small birds and some would have been inconspicuously sitting on nests. In April, young birds had fledged and swelled the population; and a flock of migrating Yellow-faced Honeyeaters further bumped up our numbers. Unsurprisingly, the greatest bird variety was recorded in original woodland and older regenerated sites. These surveys, to monitor one aspect of the success of regeneration on farms, are co-ordinated by the ACT and Yass team of BirdLife Australia's Birds with Farms program in partnership rural landholders: https://birdlife.org.au/projects/birds-on-farms

2. Burradoo on the Wingecarribee River (near Bowral)



OFF members helped to plant close to 1000 trees and shrubs over two days at a property on the banks of the Wingecarribbee River at Burradoo, along with Adopt A Tree, Southern Highlands Landcare Network and Caringbah Rotary.

The site of this planting links upstream and downstream plantings to provide a continuous corridor for fauna habitat and also stabilises banks and improves water quality, including for platypus.

RESTORATION AND CARBON CAPTURE

Bush Heritage Australia is also re-greening country on their reserves, but not including agriculture; they are fully restoring landscapes and capturing carbon as well on cleared, unproductive land. The first seeds of a world-class restoration project are planted and set the bar for future carbon projects

In partnership with <u>Greening Australia</u>, Bush Heritage's restoration work at <u>Ediegarrup Reserve</u> is setting a new standard for carbon sequestration on. Ediegarrup Reserve 140km east of Albany on Koreng Noongar Country in south-west Western Australia. Read more <u>here</u>

2023 BANKS VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR AWARDS

OFF's nominee, Geoff Francis, received a 2023 Banks Volunteer of the Year Award on 11 October. The awards were presented by David Coleman MP and Senator Jane Hume, in a ceremony to recognise and celebrate the wonderful efforts of volunteers in the many community organisations in the Federal electorate of Banks. More than 50 volunteers were nominated by their organisations. OFF's nomination read:

Geoff is a stalwart member of Oatley Flora and Fauna Conservation Society and his specialist knowledge in many fields of natural science is valued by our organisation. He also generously shares his knowledge with the wider community, for the benefit of all. He has volunteered with councils and community groups (including Conservation Volunteers Australia - CVA) in a range of programs including Bushcare and Streamwatch, for more than 20 years.

Over that period Geoff has also dedicated many, many hours to studying vulnerable species, in particular the



Grey-headed Flying-fox and the Koala. He loads his records onto the NSW Department of Planning and Environment's Bionet database, so they are available in the public domain. Since 2010, Geoff has monitored and reported on the Grey-headed Flying Fox camp in Myles Dunphy Reserve in Oatley. His valuable records of this threatened species and the food sources on which it depends, was acknowledged in the Draft Oatley Flying-fox Camp Management Plan 2021. He has also undertaken bushcare in this reserve, to enhance the flying-foxes' habitat.

Since 2016 Geoff has undertaken a range of activities to monitor Koala populations in the Southern Highlands and Sydney Basin; these include radio-tracking and canopy searches. Currently he is volunteering 2 days per month, just on Koala surveys. He is a champion for greater protection of local wetlands and Sydney's water catchment. He has liaised with Sydney Water to regularly report sewage overflows and to campaign for improvements to sewerage infrastructure.

Geoff has shared his deep knowledge and appreciation of our rich biodiversity with residents by leading them on Aussie Backyard Bird Counts (a citizen science program celebrating its 10th anniversary this year) and night-spotting walks. Recently he has been leading field trips for CVA's Rockdale Wetlands Project. Geoff is a quiet achiever who is dedicated to protecting our environment for the benefit and enjoyment of all in our community. This award is so well-deserved by Geoff and OFF members thank you for your huge contribution to the environment sustained over such a long period of time.

PASSING OF WENDY CORNISH

Long-standing OFF member and Oatley resident Wendy (or Claire) Cornish, OAM, also known as "the Raffle Queen" or "Mrs Raffle" passed away on 13th October. Wendy was a teacher and became an accomplished and popular principal at Hurstville Grove Infants School. She was often seen tending to her property in Yarran Rd, which was a wildlife refuge and probably had the first verge garden in the LGA.

Wendy dedicated her retirement to helping many causes including Oatley Lions, Country Women's Association and Riverwood Air League.

Wendy was best known for her fundraising efforts for Bezzina House (St George Hospital Community Cancer Care Centre) and the hospital's Lamrock Committee. She was awarded an OAM for her volunteer work in 2002

WARRAGAMBA WALL RAISING SHELVED-

In May 2020, Harry Burkitt spoke to OFF about the campaign to stop the NSW Government raising the height of the Warragamba Dam wall. Wilderness Australia reported on November 1, 2023, that the Development Application has been officially withdrawn. Many conservation groups, traditional owners, scientists, technical experts, local councils and local residents had banded together for over half a decade to ensure the dam wall height was never increased. The successful "Stop the Dam" campaign is a timely reminder that when we work together and stay focussed, we can be successful in our endeavours to stand up for the environment, regardless of the odds.
