Welcome to the new OFF Committee for 2022. Kim Wagstaff was reelected as President, as were Adrian Polhill Vice-President, Scott Shade Secretary and Rodger Robertson Treasurer. We welcome Sonia Baxant as second Vice-President, with Graham Lalchere stepping down. The 10 other committee positions were all filled giving OFF a complete committee for 2024, and welcome Susan Ghosn onto the committee. We also thank Liz Cameron, who stepped down from the committee this year, for her many years of service including 11 years as Secretary. Committee details will be printed on the program coming out shortly.

## SECRETARY'S REPORT, SUMMARY: Scott Shade

Our "green" incoming Secretary began by thanking Liz Cameron for 11 years of service in the role, and for her assistance in bringing him up to speed. He then listed the activities OFF was involved in during our first year of face to face meetings after the "pandemic era".

#### HIGHLIGHTS

**2023 Banks Volunteer of the Year Award** was presented by David Coleman MP and Senator Jane Hume to OFF stalwart Geoff Francis, active in many forms of conservation for over 20 years.

**Significant Tree Register** became a reality after several years of lobbying by OFF, however only 2.5% of nominations were successful.

**OFF Research Grants** Research grants of \$5900 were allocated to 3 students. A significant and ongoing leg up for the new generation of PhD students we should be proud of.

National Tree Day Many OFF members joined in the planting on July 30. Greater Sydney Landcare Network (GSLN) Relationship with GSLN strengthened due mainly to the efforts of Adrian Polhill, strong advocate for the Creating Canopies in Greater Sydney project A list of 9 sites in the LGA (est'd 10 -15,000 trees) will soon be comfirmed for planting events in 2024. Clean Up Australia Day 2023, OFF continued its 31 year participation in CUAD at Poulton Park, with 59 enthusiastic volunteers, including Second Mortdale Scouts and Oatley Lions.

**StreamWatch** was re-instated following the appointment of a full time coordinator by GSLN and the delivery of the chemical testing kits.

# **CAMPAIGNS**

**Damage to our Natural Bushland** 2023 saw several incidents that caused serious damage to OP's bushland and public spaces. OFF continued to fight for mitigation and remediation (including for Kyle Williams Reserve) and for GRC to value our bushland areas as a natural asset.

**Save Glenlee O**FF continued the fight for Glenlee including attending a May rally, sending letters to council (who are onboard), state & federal MP's

Georges River Biodiversity and Foreshore Studies (LEP2021 - FSPA revisited OFF made submission to this without response to date.

Oatley Park Plan of Management & Master Plan OFF made a submission. Removal of Vegetation from our Reserves. Brian Dale took the fight up to the GRC General Mngr on removal of plant material from council reserves.

**Synthetic Turf Playing Fields** Adrian led our campaign on this issue, armed with the NSW Chief Scientist & Engineer's report and other facts from an AUSMAP webinar. A Notice of Motion was tabled by Councillor Peter Mahoney to GRC, but no action to date.

**Mangrove Deterioration in LKB** Many members raised their voices on this, possibly related to sewage overflows, but Georges RiverKeeper determined that it was most likely caused by the larvae of the Native Mangrove Moth.

Koalas & Greater Sydney Koala Network (GSKN) OFF and individual members made submissions to different campaigns run by GSKN relating to the inappropriate housing development around Appin & Mt Gilead.

### **ACTIVITIES & COMMUNICATION**

Re-greening Country Activities continued at Vince Heffernan's Moorlands (near Gunning, NSW) property with OFF members contributing to more planting. Endangered Superb Parrots are now breeding at Moorlands.

Approximately 1300 trees were also planted along the banks of the Wingecarribee River at Burradoo (Bowral).

Locally, Matt Allison worked with Kogarah Bay Progress Assoc to plant and maintain several sites funded by the Fed Govt QE Silver Jubilee celebration.

## **GRC Historical Markers Program – Myles Dunphy**

A submission was lodged in April nominating a marker for Myles but we were unsuccessful.

**Menai Wildflower Volunteer Nursery** OFF members joined Adrian and Janine in assisting Lloyd Hedges and the Menai Wildflower Group volunteers with the growing of 15,000 trees for the 'Glossies in the Mist' project and >2,000 trees and shrubs for various Rotary Adopt A Tree projects.

**Engagement with GRC** 2023 was a record year for OFF members attending and speaking passionately at GRC meetings on various environmental issues and many members made written submissions.

**General Meetings** OFF held 10 General meetings in 2023 with people attending both in person at Oatley Uniting Church Hall and via zoom, for an average attendance of 35. A fascinating range of guest speakers, both live and on zoom, engaged the members on various interesting topics.

**Field Days** 8 Walks were held with an average attendance of 13. The highest at 25 was for the May 28 walk along the Jinga Track in Dharawal NP to remember Sharyn Cullis.

**Membership** At the end of 2023 we had 279 registered/financial members, a slight drop from just shy of 300 members at the beginning of the year.

Market stalls OFF held 6 stalls during the year selling calendars and plants: Lions market days, National Tree Day and 3 in Oatley & Mortdale in Dec..

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS, SUMMARY: Kim Wagstaff

The Secretary's report certainly shows the breadth of OFF activities that we have taken on in support of our local and wider environment!

#### **Priorities For 2024**

- A. **Climate Emergency response** everything else largely flows from this! Emissions reduction at all levels to reduce Urban Heat Island impacts.
- B. **Protection of existing trees** Ensure the revised Tree Management Policy (now including the Significant Tree Register) does the job it is intended to do.
- C. Lots more tree planting Increase canopy cover towards targeted 40%. Work with Council, Greater Sydney Landcare and other community groups.
- D. Responding to State Government's proposed new housing policies for increased densities, to ameliorate significant environmental impacts.

KEY PROJECTS/CAMPAIGNS contributing to these goals are:

- 1. Assessment of climate change impacts in council decisions/policies.
- 2. **Expand Council climate actions** from GRC's own operations to whole LGA and its population eg FOGO, EV charging stations, use of solar power.
- 3. **Save Glenlee** –Prevent loss of large area of native forest, habitat and biodiversity corridor along Georges River
- 4. **Biodiversity calamity** Australia has an appalling track record on extinctions. Protect, create and supplement biodiversity corridors. Support the Council's recently adopted Wildlife Protection Area Policy.

We will continue to improve relations with GRC developing a cooperative working relationship-and greater influence. We have already made much progress and I acknowledge the Councillors from GRRR Party in this regard. We also hope to re-establish quarterly meetings with Mayor and senior staff. **ORGANISATIONAL ISSUES** 

Membership drive – including younger age groups – Facebook has helped in this endeavour to some extent. It's a longer term goal but we have encouraged events with scouts, school groups and general community and family groups to engage with both children and parents.

I'd like to thank OFF committee members for their support and encouragement in OFF's activites for the hard work in keeping OFF running effectively and efficiently, in particular, to Liz Cameron who is retiring from Committee after 11 years service. A remarkable contribution!

Finally, thank you to all members for your support of and participation in OFFactivities. Please continue to provide your feedback on our activities, events, and campaigns both how they could be improved and suggestions for new ones. I look forward to the year ahead. 
# **NSW GOVERNMENT PLANNING CHANGES.**

The NSW Government is proposing changes to the planning system to respond to the "housing crisis". These changes will detrimentally affect **ALL** residential property in NSW.

These planning reforms will bypass local councils and remove every homeowner's right to object to neighbouring developments. This will have a devastating effect on our environment and our community. There will be a massive loss of tree canopy, increased pressure on infrastructure such as

the sewage system, which is already causing river/creek pollution and health risk and devastation in the Foreshore Scenic Protection Area (imagine duplexes on blocks as small 450 square metres!). Only local planning by Georges River Council in consultation with residents (as is the case now) can align with our values and decide what is right for us.

The map below shows the extent of the areas that will be affected, ie, all areas of our Local Government Area.

If you are concerned about these proposals, please let the Government know; even a brief submission will suffice.

Submissions on these proposed changes must be made by 23<sup>rd</sup> February and can be made <a href="here">here</a> (just scroll down the resulting page).





This policy will override all existing Council planning controls such as those protecting heritage and environment. There will be non-refusal standards - no appeal for overshadowing etc. Georges River Council has met its required housing targets - but there are no exemptions. 400m from any railway station - up to 8 storey (21m max) units may be built.

Up to 800m from any railway station or shopping area 2 storey (16m max) units and other multi dwellings. There is no local character taken into account. Landscaping and tree canopy targets and floor space ratios are far below council targets.

Dual occupancies will be able to be built everywhere on lots as small as 450m2. There is no consideration of aging and already inadequate infrastructure such as sewage - we already have regular overflows into our waterways. Hospitals, traffic, parking, transport, water, schools- none of these are having capacity increased. Current council strategic planning requires council to allocate areas of medium and high density which has worked well.

#### 19 February – Birds on Farms: From 1995 till now

Margot Oorebeek, Project Coordinator for BirdLife Australia, will tell us about the Birds on Farms project, a citizen-science monitoring program assessing woodland bird communities in agricultural landscapes. Originally operating from 1995 - 1997, Birds on Farms was re-established in 2017, and more than 5,000 bird surveys have been conducted across south-eastern Australia.

Margot moved to Australia for her PhD, studying Ixodes hirsti, an avian tick in South Australia. After completion, Margot worked at the Broome Bird Observatory for two years before moving to Perth as a senior zoologist/ornithologist for an environmental consultancy After eight years she moved to Tasmania to become Regional Cat Management Coordinator for northwest Tasmania. She has returned to her love of birds

**MEMBERSHIP**. Members who have not yet paid their membership fees are requested to do so, now that we have commenced the year's program.


#### TREE MANAGEMENT POLICY

Georges River Council at its meeting on 27 November 2023 resolved to publicly exhibit the draft revised Tree Management Policy. The council states that: "Overall, the content of the existing Policy remains substantially unchanged in the revised Policy. The revised Policy has been drafted with a renewed focus on the enhancement and management of trees to facilitate the delivery of the adopted canopy target. Equal significance is placed upon both private and public trees as Council cannot meet its canopy target by increasing canopy cover on public land alone." Amongst a number of changes is the insertion of a new chapter "to give effect to Council's Significant Tree Register.", something for which OFF campaigned for some time.
